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Foot Rot

Grazing season is upon us, and depending upon the weather conditions in your area this spring, you may find conditions are prime for a case or two of foot rot. The bacterium that cause foot rot enter through a break in the tissue of the foot. And while Galloway feet are known to be rock solid, several weeks of prolonged wetness and mud can cause them to soften enough to be susceptible to abrasion and allow entrance of the *Fusobacterium necrophorum* bacterium into the soft tissue of the foot. According to Oklahoma State University Extension, "*F. necrophorum* appears to act cooperatively with other bacteria... thereby decreasing the infective dose of *F. necrophorum* necessary to cause disease. *Prevotella intermedia* has also been implicated as causative agent for foot rot." Any abrasion to the foot can allow a bacterial invasion that overwhelms the body's ability to combat the bacterial onslaught.

Lameness is the first visual indicator most producers will notice. Either an unwillingness to walk, or an unwillingness to bear full weight on the affected foot. If the infection has had time to progress, you may even get a whiff of the malodorous by-product of a foot rot that has opened up and is draining. Time is not your friend with foot rot. Failure to treat quickly can allow the bacteria to invade deeper into the structures of the foot and cause extensive damage of the sort that is much more difficult to repair. Also it is important to realize that all that oozing is spreading infectious bacteria wherever the animal does walk.

The signs you may notice, according to the Foot Rot in Cattle | Oklahoma State University (okstate.edu) webpage, are:

- * Extreme pain leading to sudden onset of lameness, which increases in severity as the disease progresses.
- * Acute swelling and redness of interdigital tissues and adjacent coronary band.
- * Lesions in the interdigital space are often necrotic along its edges and have a characteristic foul odor.
- * Evenly distributed swelling around both digits and the hairline of the hoof, leading to separation of the claws.
- * Loss of appetite.
- * Fever

There are a couple of other foot ailments that can be confused with foot rot, which is why a visual examination of the foot is so important. Specifically, digital dermatitis, also known as hairy heel

Big changes at the NWSS for 2022

The National Western Stock Show has been undergoing extreme renovations over the past two years. When the show reopens in January 2022 after taking a year off for COVID, participants who have historically been housed ‘in the Yards’ will find that space completely transformed and updated into a modern, cattle and people friendly venue.

Per the website:

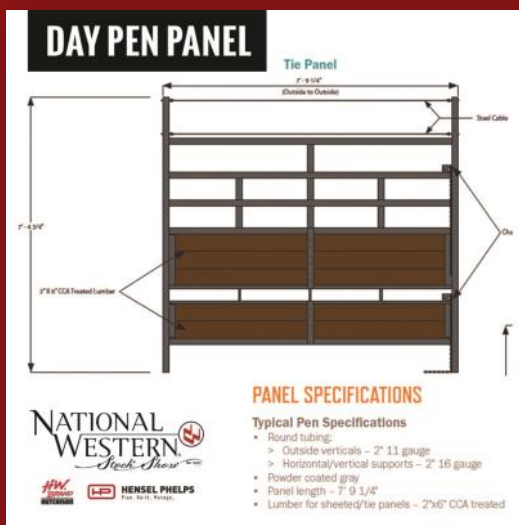
**** Standard size Day Pens are 24’ x 32’ with the ability to create larger pens for carloads or large groups. Night Pens are standard 16’ x 24’ with flexible options as well.**

**** For every 24’ x 32’ pen, there will be six, 20-amp circuits with their own breaker box. There are multiple water spigots per aisle.**

**** Up to 180 wash stations in the new Yards, ½ tempered ½ regular tap water. 4’ splash guards will be installed to protect neighboring pens from getting wet.**

**** A 70’ x 95’ lighted exercise area will be filled with sand and available for exhibitors to use.**

**** There are now three “main alleys”, one at 28’ and two at 24’ wide. All cross aisles are 16’ wide and have alley gates to accommodate moving unhaltered cattle.**



Per the NWSS website: “We’ve now got dozens of indoor restrooms which is a HUGE improvement from our former facilities!”

“Hospitality Room: This 1000 sq foot room located on the 2nd floor provides views of The Yards with full A/V capabilities for breed associations to host meetings and small genetics sales.” (nationalwestern.com)

So. If you’ve been to the NWSS in past years, you are probably drooling by now over some of these improvements! Whether you have been attending in years past, or whether you’re just starting to gain an interest in doing some showing, or just supporting the breeders who do show, there is a lot to look forward to at the 2022 Denver Stock Show.

warts, affects the skin only, from the region of the heel bulb and moving toward the dewclaws. Lameness can also be caused by a foreign body in the foot, or an abscess.

Prevention of any illness is always Plan A, and adequate zinc intake can help reduce the incidence of foot rot. Adding zinc methionine to loose free choice mineral can be an effective means of reducing the incidence in the herd. There is also a vaccine called Fusogard which can help reduce foot rot in a herd. (I have spoken with one producer who saw tremendous results when they started using it.)

Ultimately, when foot rot comes knocking, its time for antibiotics and possibly some anti-inflammatories. Since the foot will be restrained for inspection, cleaning it and treating with a topical antimicrobial such as copper sulfate is practical and beneficial. A long acting tetracycline injection is an efficient and cost effective treatment, but talk with your veterinarian.



If your lame bovine exhibits swelling at the hairline between the two toes, foot rot is likely the culprit.

accessed at the UN website. If you go looking for it, be prepared to read about things such as:

“...[E]xplore the consequences of replacing beef with different alternatives. Beef is used as a base case for two reasons. First, of all the types of commercially available animal based protein for the mass market, beef has the greatest effects on health and environmental outcomes and hence its substitution is likely to reveal the greatest consequences. Second, research on cultured beef is in advance of culturing other types of meat, and consequently the sector has the best quantitative information to include in the models.”

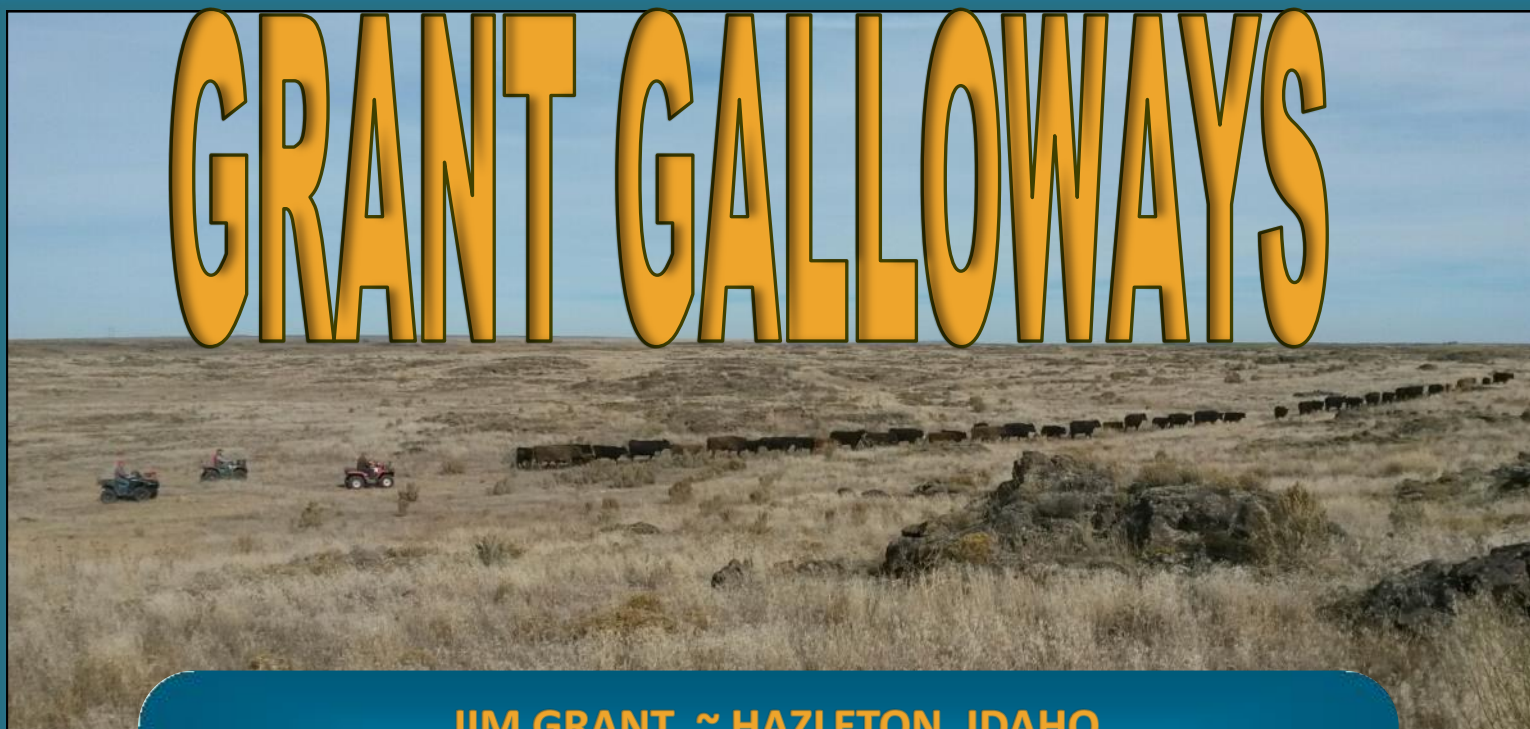

Greetings to all.

Well, its calving season once again (for all of us spring calvers). At our farm it's a time of excitement, anticipation, and anxiety.

We are excited to increase our herd and to welcome new heifers to the breeding stock. It is also a chance to look at the possibility of holding back a bull or two if you see some traits that look good.

There is also anxiety because you never know what could or will go wrong. So, in anticipation of the worst while hoping for the best it is good to have some things on hand just in case. SDSU Extension suggests the following:

Disposable long-sleeve obstetrical (OB) gloves

OB lubricant

Paper towels

Clean calf OB chains or straps and handles

Calf-puller

Halter and rope

Oxytocin or epinephrine

Iodine or chlorhexidine for disinfecting navel stumps

Sterile syringes and appropriately sized needles

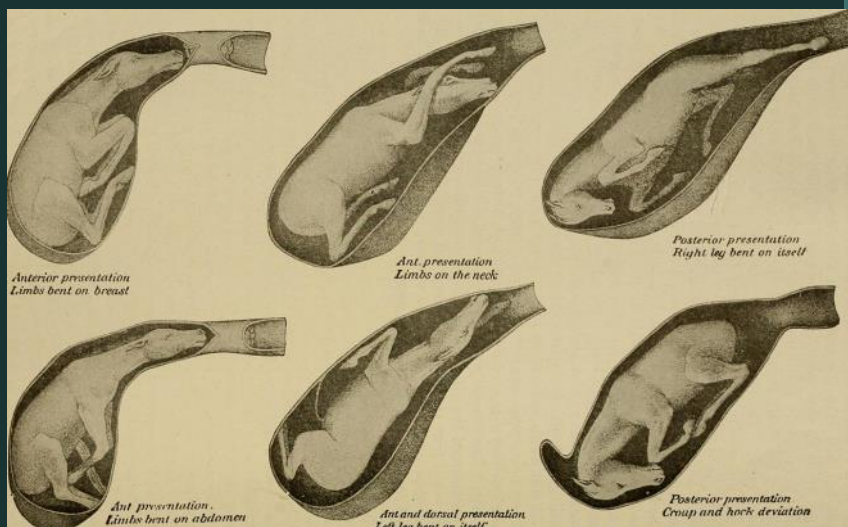
Frozen colostrum or packages of colostrum replacer

Esophageal feeder

Electrolytes

Tag box with tags and tag marker

Bander and bands – if banding at calving

Louisville World Galloway Congress 2021 Cancelled

The US Belted Galloway Society's Council met via Zoom on April 13, 2021, to discuss and review plans for hosting the rescheduled 2021 World Galloway Congress in Louisville, Kentucky, USA, in November of 2021.

A presentation of the survey results sent to over 900 potential delegates was shared with the Council by the current WGC Chairman, Jon Bednarski. With more than 70% of the respondents indicating they would not attend the Congress due to concerns regarding COVID-19, related travel restrictions, and testing or quarantine requirements, the Council voted unanimously to cancel the event.

With the next World Galloway Congress scheduled for 2023 in Switzerland, the council decided to not re-schedule the event in Louisville. All registered paid delegates will receive a refund in the next 30 days.

We regret not being able to host the Congress. However, the health and safety of delegates was a top priority. We are hopeful we can gather again in 2023.
