## Halter Breaking 101

So with the two main Galloway show entry deadlines lurking on the horizon, why not brush up on step one in preparing to show a calf: Halter breaking.

There are many schools of thought on this subject. Today we will hear from my school! Not everyone agrees with this method, but we have good results, and always find ways to tweak it.

Upon weaning the calves, begin the gentling process. We want them to lose whatever degree of fear of us they are harboring. They need to trust us to be gentle, and learn that we don't represent a threat. Getting them bunk broke with some sort of feed helps a lot with this. After about a week of this, run them in the chute and put rope halters on them. Turn them back out and let them drag those rope halters for one to three days. As the lead ropes get stepped on, they are learning to 'give' with their heads. After that, tie them up to a sturdy rail or post. Tie them about head high, with a quick release knot. Not enough rope that they can get it wrapped around themselves, but enough they can flop themselves to the ground if they feel that's important. We leave them tied up for a couple of hours, twice a day, for the first couple of days. Then we begin extending the



# White Angus Cattle

Bet you did a double take, am I right?

But its true. There's been a little hanky-panky going on in the laboratory, and thanks to a little maneuver called genetic editing, the researchers at Climate Adaptive Genetics are tinkering with the genes of the black Angus in an effort to improve their heat tolerance. One way of achieving this is by giving them a white hair coat instead of black. In order to make a genetically black animal yield a white progeny, the lab pulls skin fibroblasts from the ear of a selected animal. These cells are grown in a petri dish, and are 'edited' by swapping out the black hair color gene with a gene for black hide/white hair obtained from the **Silver Dun Galloway**. Dr. James West, Vander-

bilt University associate professor of medicine and chief science officer of Climate Adaptive Genetics, selected the silver dun Galloway because after an exhaustive search, the silver dun Galloway was the only breed he could find that had a gene for black hide with white hair. Most white haired cattle

have white hides as well, which is undesirable for cattle expected to be heat tolerant and spend lots of time in the sun because they get sunburn and melanoma. So the silver dun's unique combination of dark skin and light hair color proved to be just the ticket for the researchers' needs.

Once again, the Galloway breed comes through on behalf of beef improvement everywhere.

## Minnesota 4-Hers Excel With Galloway Influenced Cattle

Two Mora, MN youths garnered excellent results at the Kanabec County Fair this year. Eli Berry,

Berry Ranch Galloways, reports that Brady Strand entered a Galloway -cross heifer in the 4-H Breeding Beef show, and a Galloway-cross steer in the 4-H Market Steer show. His heifer and steer both received Blue ribbons in the 4-H shows on Friday. His market steer claimed the prize for Rate of Gain in the 4-H show. Then on Saturday Brady entered his animals in the fair's Open show, where at least 4 other breeders were competing. His 1215# Market Steer was the Reserve Grand Champion in the open show, and his heifer placed 2nd in the commercial heifer show. Brady's steer and heifer are sired by Berry's Yosemite 65Y.

time. As you prepare to untie them, work your hand up the rope and scratch under the halter where the rope passes by the ear. It gets itchy there, and they soon realize that you have good things to offer!

Now you are ready to begin leading. Head for the water tank. A short distance is nice, as neither one of you has to get worked into a lather (depends on how many you are breaking, of course). Hopefully they will drink. The stubborn ones won't. Then we drag them to a different pen or area of the pen where some nice flakes of hay or pan of feed awaits them. When they are calm and not fighting, hopefully settling in to eat, we quietly let the rope drop. We never want them to think they got away by fighting, so the rope is dropped only when they are unaware and calm. We follow this routine for a few days. Some calves get over their anxiety easier than others. But the one thing we do to each calf regardless of their temperament, is get them in our sturdy (heavy duty) blocking chute, and wash them once they are secured. We adopted the long-handled scrub brush some years ago, as it keeps hands and arms further away from a feisty kick. We find that the process of being scrubbed all over with the scrub brush, and rinsed with running water (especially on a warm day!) does fantastic things to their fear levels. This June we were breaking 4 fall 2014 heifers. One went into that chute a petrified, panicky little lady. Once secured, she

Once they are confident in you, they may still be stubborn at leading, but they aren't trying to run away with you! Now you are at a good point for teaching them to lead respectfully.

OK... let's get busy and get this done!
