Galloway: A necessary item in the young showman's show box.

Yes, you read that correctly! So Why does every 4Her in a beef program need a Galloway? All other great reasons aside (and there are several), one compelling attribute a Galloway offers the young showman is fitting practice. Learning to clip an animal is an ongoing process, and requires countless sessions with clippers in hand to develop and refine those skills. The majority of cattle in show barns today do not have the capacity for hair growth/regrowth that the Galloway breed does, particularly like we can see in animals under the age of two. While most show animals require time in the cooler to promote hair growth, the Galloway calf will happily oblige its owner with additional clipping practice

every few weeks, helping a youngster develop a steady hand and keen eye. The gentle demeanor of the Galloway steer or heifer that gets selected for this duty will help insure greater success. Our experience has been that they thoroughly enjoy being clipped, especially by a familiar face.

Be selective when you shop for a prospective animal. Not all Galloway hair is created equal. Seek out hair that is straight and silky, it will 'pop' in a much more user friendly manner. Some Galloway hair can have a wiry tendency, which is more challenging to work with.

Director's Corner

Richard Serr, Western Director and AGBA Secretary/Treasurer

My Galloway story starts in 2003. I had just started a job exploring for oil in Saudi Arabia and my wife, Bess, and I decided it was time to buy a farm. I had spent the summers of my youth on the farms of my relatives in Eastern Washington. Bess had grown up in the Air Force constantly moving from place to place. She wanted to own land and settle down. Since I was to be the WAY off the farm income, we asked my son, Ben, if he would run the place for us while we were gone. Much to my surprise, the city boy said, "Yes!" We found a 40 acre piece of heaven in NE Washington State and got to it. Ben started with pastured poultry and I began to research cattle breeds. I wanted a breed that was hardy, easy calving and required little to no care. I wanted a breed that would do well in both hot summers and cold winters. I wanted a beef breed that would produce excellent meat in a forage only environment. I got all that and more in the Galloway breed.

Our 6 foundation females and a bull came from Sarah Bowman and the wild mountains of Wyoming. I figured if they could handle those conditions then our place would be a piece of cake. They thrived on our sub irrigated pastures. I discovered that Galloways are a livestock guardian breed. No need to worry about the coyotes, cougars and bear that we have in the neighborhood. If there was a sign of trouble the whole herd would come thundering to the defense. In the past 12 years we have not lost a calf although I had one ripped up pretty good summer before last. In classic Galloway fashion, he was tough as nails and managed to survive that encounter the day after he was born. We are still waiting for the pack of wolves that lives over the hill to make a showing. Haven't seen them yet but it's only a matter of time.

Our Galloway herd became an important income stream for our farm. Specializing in grass fed genetics, we sell bred heifers, cow/calf pairs and 2 year old breeding bulls. Judy K Decker, editor 1800 E. 18th Emporia, KS 66801

We direct market our culls as locker beef. Success has depended on keeping our costs down. The fact that Galloways eat a wider variety of forbs than any other breed and have a thick winter coat that can reduce winter feeding costs up to 25% is a big help. But more important than that is the quality of the beef. There is a reason the Galloway breed does so well in taste tests. They taste great! All my customers will agree with that, some saying that it's the best beef they have ever eaten. I think that's saying a lot for grass fed and finished beef. And it's heart healthy too!

I have to say that the decision to raise Galloways has been the best decision we ever made. They have impressed in so many ways: great moms, great meat, easy keeping and good tempered animals. They have proved to be everything we could have hoped for.

Sometimes you get lucky.
